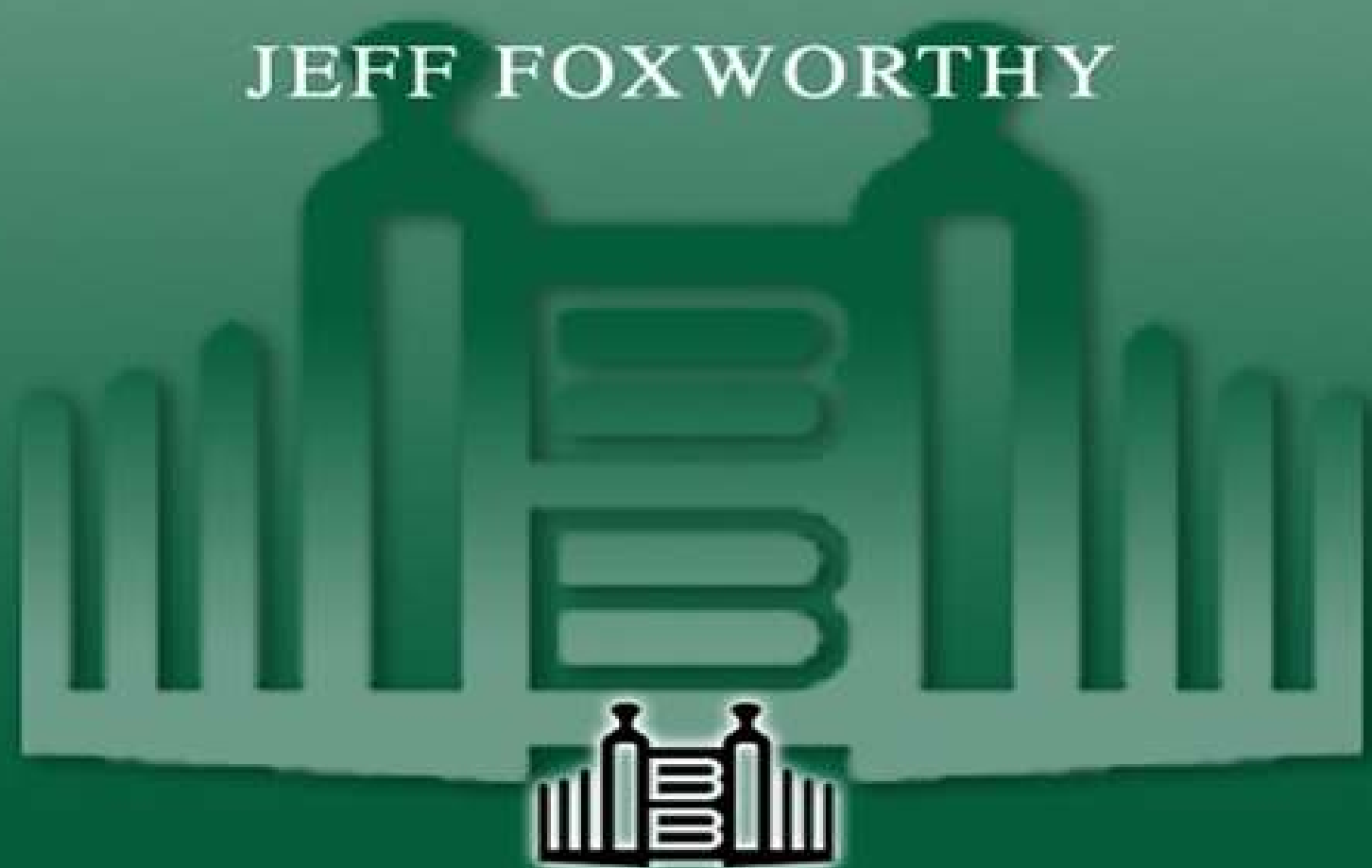

**abil·i·ties** (ə-bil'-ət-ēz), *n. and pron.* a statement of charges for services rendered and subsequent action to be taken by a specified male person. “*I don't care if he's broke, Ma, the house payments **abilities** got to pay.*”

**ac·ne** (ak'-nē), *v. and n.* concerning a male person's behavior and the result of that behavior. “*Once again we took him to a fancy restaurant, and he didn't know how to **acne** made a fool of himself.*”

**ac·quire** (ə-kwīər'), *n.* a group of singers, especially those who perform during religious ceremonies. “*She sings so pretty, she should join **acquire**.*”

**ac·quit** (ə-kwit'), *n. and v.* a personal declaration of resignation from an assigned task. “*You ain't firin' me, 'cuz **acquit!***”

**ac·tiv·ist** (akt'-əv-ist), *v. and conj.* to behave in a certain manner, particularly one based on another reality. “*She seduced me into signing that petition, and now she **activist** she don't know me!*”



**ad·min·is·ter** (at-mi'-nə-stər), *adj. and n.* a specific clergyman or agent of a government, designated by the observer. “I tell ya, **administer** is a good man.”

**af·ford** (ə-förd'), *n.* an automobile manufactured by the motor company that produced the Model T. “If I had the money for a car, I'd want to buy **afford**.”

**air·line** (er'-līn), *adv. and v.* concerning the location and dishonesty of the person being addressed or discussed. “Don't sit **airline** about it, boy ... tell the truth!”

**al·i·bi** (al'-ə-bī), *n. and v.* the predicted future purchases by a male named Albert, Alfred, or Alvin. “We always invite Al, 'cause **alibi** drinks for everybody.”

**anal** (ān'-əl), *v. and pron.* being inferior to what one expects. “Enemas **anal** they're cracked up to be.”

**an·ar·chist** (an-ər-kist'), *conj., n., and v.* additionally, having pressed one's lips to another's as a expression of affection or sensual desire. “**Anarchist** her ma, **anarchist** her sister, **anarchist** her grandma, **anarchist** her other sister, **anarchist** her other other sister, and then her dad walked in and ...”

**an·noys** (ə-nōiz'), *n.* a loud or irritating sound. “Well, I wouldn't've peed my pants if I hadn't heard **annoys!**”

**ant·hill** (ən-til'), *conj.* up to a point in time. “I won't set foot in that room **anthill** he cleans it up!”

**an·ti·pas·to** (an'-tē-past-ə), *n. and v.* to discharge from the body, as done by the female sibling

of a parent of the speaker. “After eatin' all that salami last night, my **antipasto** kidney stone.”

**ar·chery** (ärch'-ər-ē), *n. and conj.* a male person's ultimatum relating to a curved structure, usually one that serves as the roof or overhang of a passageway. “He went off to St. Louis, sayin' he was dang sure he was goin' to see the **archery** weren't coming back.”

**Ar·i·zo·na** (er'-əz-ōn-ə), *n., v., and adv.* phrase delimiting the quality of the gaseous atmosphere surrounding the earth. “I'd move to Denver, but with all the smog that **Arizona** slightly better than it here in L.A.”

**Ar·kan·sas** (ärk'-ən-sə), *n. and v.* a flat-bottomed boat in conjunction with an observer's visual perception. “Noah finished the **Arkansas** that it was good.”

**ar·son** (ar'-sən), *adj. and n.* pertaining to the male offspring of the speaker. “I know I swore **arson** didn't set fire to your car, Sheriff, but I guess I misspoke.”

**at·mo·sphere** (ət'-məs-fir), *pron. and v.* a conjecture about the feelings of anxiety of a certain being. “The way that ol' Red tucks his tail, now, that's a dog **atmosphere** his owner.”

**at·trac·tor** (ə-trak'-tər), *n.* a motor-propelled machine used mainly in agriculture. “My uncle cuts his grass with **attractor**.”

**Au·di** (au'-dē), *n.* a protrusion; usually used to describe the knotted flesh on the stomach of a human left after the severing of the umbilical cord. “Most people have an ‘innie,’ but Roy's belly button is definitely an **Audi**.”

**au·ra** (ər'-ə), *conj. and adj.* a phrase indicating a choice between one thing and another. “You gettin' a Quarter Pounder **aura** Big Mac?”

**au·to·mate** (ə'-tə-māt), *v.* a suggestion for procreation. “I know we just met tonight, baby, but I think we **automate**.”







**bar·i·um** (ber'-ē-əm), *v. and n.* to deposit a male person or animal underground and cover him with earth. “My dog died yesterday, so we're gonna **barium** today.”

**bar·rel** (ber'-əl), *n. and v.* a large, thick-furred, omnivorous mammal of the family Ursidae and its predicted actions. “A wolverine'll mess you up, but a **barrel** kill you.”

**bat·tery** (ba'-tər-ē), *n. and pron.* a baseball player who regularly attempts an offensive maneuver wherein he uses a club to strike a ball thrown in his direction. “Stan ain't half the **battery** used to be.”

**be·hav·ior** (bi-hāv'-yər), *v. and adj.* a phrase connecting the manner in which a person conducts himself or herself to someone or something possessed by or related to that person. “If you don't **behave**, daddy's gonna spank you!”

**Bei·rut** (bā'-rüt), *adj. and n.* a path that crosses or follows the contours of a broad inlet of water that curves into a landmass. “I guess old Doug decided to take the **Beirut**.”

**be·nign** (bē-nīn'), v. and adj. to reach a level of one increment more than eight. “The scar from your tumor removal is going to **benign** inches long.”

**bor·der** (bōr'd-ər), v. and n. to have made a female feel uninterested and fatigued, as through tedious action or talk. “She said she left him because he **border** to death.”

**bor·row** (bār'-ō), n. and v. a phrase concerning the future state of a tavern. “Hurry up or the **borrow** be closed!”

**bot·tle** (bāt'-əl), n. and v. the corporeal form of a being and its future state. “If you keep eatin' and drinkin' like that, your **bottle** go bad.”

**ca·dav·er** (kəd-av'-ər), *v. and adj.* pertaining to the possibility of gaining possession of something belonging to a female. “The coroner had to get back to the morgue, but she said I **cadaver** fries.”

**ca·jole** (kə-jōl'), *v. and n.* a request for action from a group. “I don't like being the center of attention, so **cajole** stop staring at me?”

**Ca·jun** (kāj'-ən), *n. and conj.* an enclosed space used to confine a being, especially as connected with an action. “They just threw that bear in a **Cajun** left him there.”

**can·ni·bal** (kan'-ə-bul), *v. and n.* interrogative concerning the abilities of an uncastrated male bovine. “*I've always wondered, **cannibal** mate with more than one cow in a day?*”

**can·ter** (kan'-tər), *v. and adj.* negative interrogative concerning the abilities of someone connected to a female. “***Canter** sister watch the baby?*”

**can·ti·na** (kan-tē'-nəh), *v. and n.* interrogative concerning the actions or abilities of a person who uses a nickname for Christine. “*Hey, **cantina** bring us a couple of cold beers?*”

**ca·pa·ble** (kāp'-ə-bul), *n., adj., and n.* a garment that ties at the neck and hangs across the back and its association with an uncastrated male bovine. “*Soon as he sees a red **capable** will attack.*”

**cer·ti·fy** (sər'-təf-ī), *n. and conj.* a phrase applying a condition or assumption to the use of formal term for a male person. *“I wouldn't've called her **certify** had known it was a woman.”*

**cin·em·a** (sin'-əm-ə), *v. and n.* to cause a thing to be delivered to a male. *“I was so mad at the producer of that movie, I **cinema** letter givin' him a piece of my mind.”*

**cir·cus** (sər'-kəs), *n. and conj.* a formally addressed justification of actions, as spoken to ma

person. "I can't refund your money **circus** I don't work here."

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**city** (sit'-ē), *v. and n.* the act of reclining onto the buttocks, as connected with a male's subsequent response or action. "On account of his hemorrhoids, every time he tries to **city** screams."

**clar·i·fy** (kler'-əf-ī), *adj. and conj.* the dependence of the lucidity of a thing or concept on another condition or action. "I'm not **clarify** should stay or go."

**cop·per** (kăp'-ər), *n. and conj.* a choice between a law enforcement officer and someone else. “Any sixth grader with a full beard is either a **copper** or a narc.”

**coun·ter·feit** (kaunt'-ər-fit), *n. and v.* a flat surface used for storage, the transaction of business, or dining, and its dimensions with respect to those of a specific place. “We should have measured the kitchen first, 'cuz no amount of money'll make this **counterfeit** in there.”
